## Joint Charging Standards (CPS)

These can be found on <a href="http://www.cps.gov.uk/legal/l">http://www.cps.gov.uk/legal/l</a> to o/offences against the person/ and were updated in October 2009. The purpose of them is to illustrate the levels of harm and differentiating factors between the different non-fatal offences.

In part they ameliorate the problems of the current definitions, but they also aim to provide consistency.
